national learning collaborative, Optimizing Health and Well-Being for Black and African American Transgender and Gender Diverse (TGD) Communities. Sponsored by the Fenway Institute's National LGBTQIA+ Health Education Center, this monthly workshop series brought together community healthcare providers throughout the nation so they might better understand the barriers and challenges that Black and African American TGD people often face when seeking health care and wellness support. Best practices to build affirming health care experiences were shared by community activists and healthcare providers with extensive leadership experience. Shante Austin, a Patient Navigator with STAR's Care Coordination Program, actively participated in all four sessions and was asked to share her assessment of the program with STAR Community Link readership. Shante noted that June's session, which included an expert panel who advised what healthcare workers should be aware of when caring for Black/African American TGD people, "was

Amari recalled a time when their doctor laughed at their identity as non-binary, leading them, the Director of the Campaign to End AIDS at Positive Impact Health Centers in Atlanta, to say they would rather die with dignity at home than have to defend who they are to a doctor. Shante noted that the learning collaborative series became "underwhelming" when specific sessions neglected to mention how racism plays a part in the substantial rates of unemployment, homelessness, and delay of necessary healthcare of Black and African American TGD people. Shante was asked how STAR might move forward with what we learned from the collaborative. "We need to speak with the community directly and bring them into the conversation. They should lead the conversation." Shante went on to note that many of the people we serve are transient and may move around during the year. "We need to meet them where they're at. Don't let them fall through the cracks." Describing the harm caused by "domestic violence, self-harm, and substance use, compounded by transphobia," Shante emphasized the importance of culturally attuned mental health services. "It's very easy for people to be overwhelmed with the weight of the world living in New York City."

Ensuring that every individual's health record is complete with this information is an important next step in the provision of specific and meaningful patientcentered care. Shante cautioned against stereotyping Black and African American TGD people. "Suffering exists, but that's not all there is. No one wants to be sensationalized. People are more than their surgeries." Noting that reducing stigma leads to better health outcomes, Shante recommended that STAR sponsor specific social media campaigns informed by the voices of Black and African American transgender and gender diverse patients. "I would love to hear more from our patients."

In 2018, in response to implementation barriers, provider input, and evolving literature, NYC DOHMH integrated changes into an existing HIV patient navigator-centered program that had served STAR patients and thousands of other NYC individuals living with HIV since 2009. The PROMISE study (Program Refinements to Optimize Model Impact and Scalability based on Evidence) was launched in 2018 to evaluate the implementation of revisions to the HIV Care Coordination Program, which were intended to minimize persistent disparities in HIV outcomes among high-need persons living with HIV in New York City. STAR Program staff (Lori Hurley and Antoinette Davis) served on the Community Advisory

Board and recruited patients to be interviewed for this study, supported by NIH (R01 MH117793) and undertaken by NYC DOHMH and the CUNY Institute for Implementation Science in Population

Using discrete choice experiment methodology, the study explored Care Coordination (CCP) clients' experiences in the program, and the extent to which they felt the program responded to their needs. Two key general preferences emerged. Clients endorsed telehealth for ART adherence support and visit location, and clients endorsed intensive services, such as directly observed therapy (DOT) and Patient Navigator home visits, comparatively less frequently than less intensive CCP services. In addition, 40% endorsed telehealth for CCP visit location and ART adherence support and endorsed help with securing housing/food; 37% endorsed telehealth for CCP visit location and ART adherence support and endorsed staff reminding/arranging transportation to get to appointments; and 23% endorsed staff meeting clients at program location for CCP visits and staff working with clients to
